

Manchester Arena... and London Bridge...

The tragic event in Manchester Arena last month, when a suicide bomber killed at least 22 people and injured more than 60 others, horrified the entire country – as did the awful atrocity on London Bridge more recently.

One day Jesus was told that some Galileans offering sacrifices in the temple had been massacred. He answered: "Do you suppose that these Galileans were worse sinners than all other Galileans, because they suffered such things? I tell you, no; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish.

Jesus knew the imminent danger every human being is in because It is appointed unto man once to die, and after death, the judgment. It was a tender warning - to His hearers and to us as well.

Jesus then illustrated the importance of conversion. For three years, the owner of a fig tree looked for fruit - but found none. Finally he ordered: *Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?* His gardener pleaded *Sir, leave it alone this year also while I dig around it and put on manure. Then if it bears fruit* - he pauses - then simply says - but if not, you may cut it down. He longs for it to survive.

Jesus' solemn lesson is clear. God instructs us to repent. He is patient and - for a limited time - gives us the opportunity to do so. Today He urges each of us to come to Him for mercy and forgiveness. Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thought; let him return to the LORD, and He will have mercy upon him; and to our God for He will abundantly pardon.

A tender appeal from our merciful God!

When I survey the wondrous cross, on which the Prince of glory died, my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast save in the death of Christ my God: all the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to His blood.

See, from His head, His hands, His feet, sorrow and love flow mingled down; did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown?

His dying crimson, like a robe, spreads o'er His body on the tree: then am I dead to all the globe, and all the globe is dead to me.

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were an offering far too small; love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.
